Perfect picture!

This is a classroom in Rwanda, a small country in central Africa. Can you count how many children there are in just one class?! Rwanda is the most densely populated country in Africa, with one baby born every minute. The schools are so full of children that some pupils have to stand outside and are taught through the windows.

Question time!

In what ways is the class room different to yours?
In what ways is it similar?
What does the teacher have to help the children to learn?
What do you think the children might be learning about? Look for clues in the picture.

Writing challenge!

Imagine that you are one of the children in the picture. Write a letter to someone in your house explaining what it is like to learn in this classroom. 'Post' the letter to them by leaving it somewhere in the house where they will find it.











Perfect Picture!

Look at the picture and you will understand why Rwanda is known as the 'country of a thousand hills'. Many of the hills that you can see are actually volcanoes. The Virunga Mountains are a chain of volcanoes in East Africa, along the northern border of Rwanda, the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Uganda.

Story starter!

Using the passive and active voice.


The house, which is hidden deep amongst the trees, is surrounded by luscious, green plants. (passive voice)
